COVER STORY: Kira Delivers Triplets !!!



ira, our eight-year-old Amur tiger, gave Zookeepers and Annual Meeting attendees a tremendous thrill by giving birth to a litter of cubs early in the morning on Saturday, May 21. **An experienced mother** – this is her third litter – Kira delivered a total of four cubs; three survived. There are two females and one male cub (they weighed in at 4.1 pounds, 3.8 pounds, and 3.7 pounds at 3 days of age). Recently, the cubs have

begun to emerge from the den. In their first few weeks, live den footage was available via the LCD television screen in the ZOT Zone, giving visitors an inside look at how a tigress tends to her young.

This is a significant birth for the species,

since there are now more Amur tigers in zoos than in the wild. Each newborn Amur tiger cub is critical to the survival of the species. We are delighted to support the efforts of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association (AZA) in Rochester, and we look forward to helping provide a safe, healthy environment in which these cubs can grow. We will follow the recommendations of the Tiger Species

FAST**FACTS**

Amur Tiger (Panthera tigris altaica)

The Amur (or Siberian) Tiger is the largest living cat in the world. The name 'Siberian' is actually incorrect because these tigers do not live in Siberia. They are found in Russian Far East in the Amur-Ussuri region of Primorski and Khabarovski Krais (States) while a few are across the border in northern China and Korea.

Weight of adult male: Up to 600 lbs. Weight of adult female: Up to 400 lbs. Length of adult male: Up to 10 ft.

Survival Plan (SSP) in placing her offspring when they have matured. Seneca Park Zoo Director Larry Sorel plays a major role in those decisions since he serves on the Tiger SSP Committee.

Kira arrived at our Zoo in August 2004 as recommended by the Tiger SSP with the anticipation that she and Sasha, our five-year old male, would eventually breed. It worked!

Genny C. File

Through the marvels of medical technology, we have glimpsed Genny C.'s calf for the very first time! In late April, Dr. Dennis Schmitt, professor at Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield Missouri, examined an ultrasound image provided by our elephant keepers, who were students in his class. Dr. Schmitt was able to identify the developing fetus — which was about the size of a beach ball at the time of the sonogram — using the ultrasound imagery.



A Sizzling Summer at the Zoo!

appy summer! One of our can't-miss attractions this summer is Kira and her adorable tiger cubs. This experienced mom – this is her third litter – had two females and one male on the day of our Annual Meeting. Talk about great timing! What a wonderful mom Kira is: I marvel at how she gently snatches her straying cubs with her sharp teeth and keeps their fur shiny and clean with her long tongue. The best time to see the cubs play is early or late in the day.

Have you heard? We now have two large, active male black bears summering with us. The duo has been a real crowd pleaser, splashing in the pool and chewing on tree limbs. Special thanks to Xerox Federal Credit Union for helping us inform the community about our visiting animal for 2005.

I was thrilled to learn the results of a recent opinion poll released by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association – and conducted by local Zoo sponsor Harris Interactive. The survey findings indicate that people recognize the power of zoos as an educational tool. For example:

94% of the public agrees that children are more likely to be concerned about animals if they learn about them at zoos, marine life parks, and aquariums.



95% agree that many of the successes to save endangered or declining species can be attributed, in part, to the work done in zoos and aquariums.

Our Animal Hospital is now open to the public. (Enter it from the lower road just to the north of the wallabies.) You can view the surgery suite and prep area and peek into the animal holding facility. Fortunately, the hospital is usually quiet due to preventive measures taken by the vet staff and zookeepers to monitor our animals and ensure healthy diets and ample exercise. Visit on Wednesdays or Thursdays at 11:30 a.m. to learn how the zookeepers and docents use food with unique smells or textures to keep our animals stimulated and active within their exhibits.

Finally, check out the display and poetry produced by the 5th graders from the World of Inquiry School at Luna and Nico's exhibit. From their study, students learned that wolves are loyal, intelligent, and misunderstood. This is exactly the kind of link we want to make between the classroom and special species of animal in our community Zoo.

Chase-Pitkin Butterfly Experience Reopens

Back by popular demand, the interactive and relaxing Chase-Pitkin Butterfly Experience seasonal exhibit is open now through August. Stroll through the beautiful gardens in this netted exhibit that features several butterfly species and a reflecting pond. Use the exhibit's touch-screen displays to explore the anatomy and life cycles of butterflies.

Seneca Park Zoo Society is a founding member of the national Butterfly Conservation Initiative (BFCI). BFCI is a cooperative effort among U.S. zoos to preserve butterfly habitats, particularly Monarchs and the Karner Blue, New York State's only endangered butterfly.

Learn how you can impact nature by planting a garden in your own backyard and why butterflies are so important to our environment. This exhibit will teach you the basics about the flowers and plants butterflies rely upon for food and reproduction. More information about butterfly gardening is available at www.senecaparkzoo.org.

Butterfly Beltway Takes Flight Again

For the third consecutive year, the Daisy Marquis Jones Foundation funded Butterfly

Beltway Project. In its fourth year, this program strives to raise awareness and participation in the conservation of butterfly habitats in western New York. Many local senior living facilities and special needs children's organizations are able to enjoy this hands-on, feel-good, conservation project.

Since 2001 the program has grown from five to 28 sites, giving more and more butterflies the opportunity to grow their species in the gardens we've created. The gardens now provide crucial egg-laying territory, food sources for the caterpillars and adults, and hiding and resting spots. With better habitat available, butterflies can perform their vital environmental role – pollination. Without butterflies (and birds and bees), we would not enjoy such a diversity of plants, flowers, fruits, and vegetables.

Genny C. ~ A Sight to Behold!

Based on the initial observations, it appears that Genny C.'s pregnancy is proceeding without complications.



Genny C. is New York's first and North America's eleventh African elephant to conceive after artificial insemination. The veterinary staff monitors weekly samples of the pregnancy hormone progesterone and performs weekly ultrasound

images of the fetus. Thus far, we have seen the calf's back and trunk. Genny C. is probably feeling kicks in her lower left abdomen, just in front of her knee.

Zookeepers continue to exercise Genny C. daily in hopes of keeping her total weight gain below 500 pounds as she proceeds toward a March 2006 delivery of a 250- to 300-pound calf. We'll keep you posted on further developments in upcoming ZooNooz issues.

By the way, plans are underway to build a new home for the Genny C. and her calf, so mother and child should have a spacious new home in 2006.

Den Mother Welcomes New Cubs

Kira, our female Amur tiger, gave birth to three beautiful cubs on May 21. Mother and her cubs are doing quite well. They may be venturing outside by the time you read this. If they aren't outside when you visit the Zoo, check them out on the monitor in the ZOT Zone. It provides a unique live look into Kira's den, where you can see how a tigress cares for her young.

Primate Update

The orangutan exhibit renovations took a little longer than we expected, but our great red apes will have a nice new home soon. We plan to improve the other outdoor primate exhibits as well. The spider monkey exhibit will no longer be a bachelor pad. Soon,

we'll have a group of three female spider monkeys introduced to our male. When their exhibit is complete, they will live in an expanded home.

The spider monkeys' summertime neighbors are back again. We have three American alligators visiting from Florida. They'll be with us until mid-September.







What Do You Call That Cat?

Biologists identify cougars by the scientific name Puma (Felis) concolor, meaning "cat of one color." But depending on where it lives in its range through North America, this cat can be called a puma, mountain lion, catamount, painter, or panther. In South America, it is also known by the Spanish names "leon" or "cuguacuarana."

While the cougar resembles an African lioness, its closest relative is actually

wonder...

the jaguarundi, a small cat native to Central and South America. Scientists believe both cats descended from an ancestral cougar/puma that emigrated from Asia by crossing the Bering land bridge thousands of years ago – even before your parents and grandparents were born!

Cougars are at home in many environments – from deserts, swamps, forests, and tropical jungles to foothills and rugged mountains. They are normally secretive cats that shun humans. Their primary need is a large wilderness with an adequate food supply. Once found through much of North and South America, cougars have a much more limited range today because of increased land use by humans. Most of the U.S. population of these cats is now limited to 11 western states (where they are called mountain lions). A small population (30-50 individuals) of the Florida panther, a subspecies, is protected as an endangered species and tries to survive in that southern state.




